



A WELL REGULATED FOX

In our Autumn 2009 issue, Professor Daniel Ernst of the Georgetown University Law Center took a fresh look at *Pierson v. Post*, the chestnut case – familiar to generations of first-year Property students – involving a dispute over which of two early-19th-century hunters owned a formerly feral fox. See *Pierson v. It turns out that it isn't just property scholars like Ernst (and those cited in his article) who have an interest in vulpine justice.
